Sign a date and conclude your contract. All music contracts must be signed and clearly dated by each party, verifying their understanding of the terms. All amendments must also be written, signed and dated. Warnings never sign a contract unless you understand what is expected of you, your legal rights and the consequences of breaching the agreement. Always make sure that all dates match and that each party signs in the right places. If you're an artist, make sure you keep your business rights. It is common for record and management companies to legally own your written and recorded music after the contract expires. You never agree to pay the expenses you are to incur.
